We should all be proud to be a part of such an organization.

## Chicago Dermatological Society Wins Excellence in Education Award

The Chicago Dermatological Society received the 1993 Excellence in Education Award in the professional society category from the American Academy of Dermatology at the AAD meeting in Washington, D.C. last December.

This is the third year that the AAD has honored a teaching institution and a professional society for outstanding teaching and service. The winner in the teaching institution category for 1993 was the Department of Dermatology of the Medical College of Wisconsin for its international clinical exchange program for dermatology residents. Drs. Luis A. Diaz and Evandro Rivitte developed the exchange program with the University of Sao Paulo in Brazil.

Past winners of these awards include the Skin Cancer Foundation, Psoriasis Foundation, and NIH Dermatology Section.

The Chicago Dermatological Society received the award in recognition of its outstanding programs offering clinical case presentations, discussions, lectures, and seminars from nationally recognized leaders in dermatology. Drs. Marshall Blankenship, William Caro, Allan Lorincz and J. B. Howell wrote letters of recommendation in support of this award. Dr. Howell noted, "The educational benefits, the mutual respect of members for each other, and the satisfaction gained from close contact with the most gifted dermatologists of the Midwest have enriched the lives of every member and given the Society an enviable position in both American and international dermatology." Dr. Lorincz wrote, "I am convinced that among American regional dermatological societies, the Chicago Dermatological Society most likely has the largest, most active, and well organized education program for dermatologists at all levels of training and accomplishment."

Each winner receives a \$4,000 cash prize and a "Pinnacle of Excellence" commemorative award which is underwritten by an educational grant from Dermik Laboratories, Inc. Chicago Dermatological Society President Darryl Bronson appointed a committee consisting of Drs. Sam Solomon, Kay Wier and Jim Ertle, who recommended that the \$4,000 be earmarked for the Centennial Meeting of our Society in the year 2001.

## AWARDS

The Awards Committee of the Society has chosen the recipients of the Practitioner of the Year and the Founders Award for 1994.

### Practitioner of the Year

Awarded each year to an individual for exemplary service as a practitioner of dermatology:

**Roland S. Medansky, M.D.**

### Founders Award

Awarded each year to an individual who has devoted extraordinary time and talent as a part-time teacher and clinician:

**Marshall L. Blankenship, M.D.**

#### Roland S. Medansky, M.D.

Dermatology became the career choice of Roland Medansky during his junior year in medical school at the University of Illinois. He was completely hooked when he first observed Marcus Caro, M.D. lecture and examine a patient. Caro's picture hangs in his office to this very day.

Roland left the University of Illinois for a one-year internship at Michael Reese Hospital, where he co-authored with Paul Lazar, M.D., his first publication in dermatology. He returned to the University of Illinois for his dermatology residency, which began with Dr. Caro as Chairman and ended under Adolph Rostenberg Jr., M.D. It was during Medansky's residency that he first began teaching and conducting clinical drug research (both of which he continues to enjoy today). The "art of dermatology," utilizing techniques of psychosomatic medicine, has remained his true interest. It was Milton Robin, M.D., who inspired him to pursue this aspect of dermatology.

He feels fortunate to have trained with many physicians who will be remembered in the annals of dermatology in Chicago. Also active politically, Roland is a past president of the Illinois Dermatological Society. He has served on the Board of Trustees of the Psoriasis Foundation and on the Advisory Council of the American Academy of Dermatology. He also served as a representative to the Congress of Midwest Dermatological Societies.

Roland has been in private practice in the Chicagoland area for the past 34 years and hopes to continue practicing for many years to come. He mentions with unrestrained pride and respect his professional association and friendship with Dr. Raymond Handler, his partner for 28 years. "I am also proud," he continues, "of any influence I may have had on someone whom I admire, love, and know will be a future leader in Chicago dermatology, my son-in-law, Dr. Benjamin Dubin."

Finally, among his "loves" he singles out Sheila, his wife of 38 years, as well as his son and daughter and their families.

"I have a lot to be proud of and a lot for which to be thankful," Medansky reflects. "Thank you for bestowing this honor upon me."

#### Marshall L. Blankenship, M.D.

Marshall Blankenship attended the University of Illinois College of Medicine and completed his dermatology residency at Northwestern University. He joined the faculty at Northwestern University for eight years, served as an attending dermatologist at Cook County Hospital for ten years, and has been on the staff of the Dermatology Department at Rush Medical College for the past 22 years. Dr. Blankenship has directed the Specialty Review Course in Dermatology at the National Center for Continuing Education. Additionally, he has maintained his private practice in Oak Lawn throughout. During the past 30 years he has been associated in practice with Drs. Royal Ihrke, Leon Lando, John Keane and Kenneth Bielinski.

Dr. Blankenship has been active at all levels of organized dermatology both nationally and internationally. He was president of the Chicago Dermatological Society in 1976 when the Society celebrated its 75th anniversary. He served on the organizing committee for the Illinois Dermatological Society. He has participated in many activities of the American Academy of Dermatology and has served on its Board of Directors. He is a member of 11 national and international dermatological societies, a Leader's Society member of the Dermatology Foundation, and serves as Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation for International Dermatological Education.

One of Marshall's interests is travel. His CDS Presidential Address was "Travels of a Dermatologist." Literally spanning the globe, his numerous presentations have been made to assemblies in South Africa, Zimbabwe, Japan, Australia, Egypt, Singapore, Brazil, Germany, and Argentina, to name only some. From a discussion of "Mites Other Than Scabies" before the Hospital for Tropical Diseases in Manaus, Brazil, to "Electrosurgery" presented to the Zimbabwe Medical Association, Marshall has shared his wide-ranging interests and expertise with many international audiences.

Influenced somewhat by Dr. Samuel Bluefarb's stamp collection, Marshall has an active collection of stamps of the United States. Through Dr. Ben Smith and other dermatologists, Dr. Blankenship has developed an extensive interest in "the Master" — Sherlock Holmes. He is a member of the Hounds of the Baskervilles (*sic*) which is the Chicago scion society of the Baker Street Irregulars. In addition he is an active member of four other local Sherlockian Societies and the Sir James Saunderson's Society whose members are all dermatologists. Involvement with Sherlock Holmes has led to an interest in books, and a portion of his time is spent in book stores and fairs looking for treasures.

## Research Award

Kenneth B. Gordon, M.D. will receive the Chicago Dermatological Society's Research Award for 1994. He will study extracorporeal photochemotherapy in Epidermolysis Bullosa Acquisita with David Woodley, M.D. at Northwestern University.

Hema Sundaram, M.D. who was the first recipient of the Chicago Dermatological Society Research Award, is pursuing a research fellowship at the National Institutes of Health. Her mentor is John Stanley, M.D.. Hema plans an academic career in dermatology after her fellowship.

## University Study

My laboratory has been interested in genetic skin disorders that affect structural proteins of the epidermis. Recently, we discovered the genetic basis for Dowling-Meara Epidermolysis Bullosa Simplex, Weber-Cockayne Epidermolysis Bullosa Simplex, and Epidermolytic Hyperkeratosis. Currently, we are interested in soliciting collaborators to help us obtain blood samples from patients with several genetic skin diseases:

1. Weber-Cockayne EBS. These can either be from a family with the disease or from individual cases.
2. Palmoplantar Keratoderma. Again, these can be either single cases or families.
3. Darier's or Hailey-Hailey. Here, we prefer families, the larger the better.

## Midwest Clinical Conference

On Saturday afternoon, February 12, 1994, the Chicago Dermatological Society presented the dermatology session at the Chicago Medical Society's 50th Midwest Clinical Conference. Despite the cold and snowy weather, approximately 150 people attended the course. The program director and moderator was Harry Goldin, M.D.

Benjamin Dubin, M.D. discussed "Acne, A Dermatologist's Perspective." This was a very informative talk for the general practitioners in the audience. Katherine Wier, M.D. presented "Hazards of Tanning." She reviewed both the social and medical factors that have led tanning to become such an important aspect of our society. James Ertle, M.D. then reviewed his efforts in obtaining legislation to regulate tanning and tattoo parlors. Ronald Wise, M.D. presented "An Overview of Dermatologic Allergy and Immunology." Harry Goldin, M.D. discussed common skin cancers. He presented a series of unknown slides to show the difficulties in diagnosing cutaneous lesions. Finally, Matthew Kelleher, M.D. presented an overview of psoriasis — including information about the new drug Dovonex (calcipotriene).

The talks were well received, and the audience continued to ask questions long after the session ended.

## Stephen Rothman Award

### Ruth K. Freinkel, M.D.

Ruth Freinkel, Professor and Vice-Chairman of the Department of Dermatology at Northwestern University, has been chosen by the Society for Investigative Dermatology (SID) to receive the Stephen Rothman Award for 1994. Dr. Freinkel, past editor of *The Journal for Investigative Dermatology*, is the first woman to receive the Stephen Rothman Award. Bestowed on individuals who have made longstanding contributions to the discipline of dermatology and cutaneous biology, the Rothman Award is regarded by many as the highest honor in our specialty. Dr. Freinkel is an internationally-recognized cutaneous biologist whose work has focused on epidermal biochemistry, epidermal lipids, skin endocrinology, and hair disorders. She has participated in the Structure and Function course at the annual American Academy of Dermatology meeting and designed and taught the Basic Science course in dermatology at Northwestern University for many years. The annual SID meeting was held in Baltimore this year at the Stouffer Harborplace Hotel from April 27-May 1. On the evening of May 28, a special reception in honor of Dr. Freinkel's achievement will be held. All of Dr. Freinkel's friends and colleagues are cordially invited to attend.
