CLARK W. FINNERUD, M.D.

Dr. Clark W. Finnerud was born in 1895 in South Dakota, the son of a physician. After he graduated from the University of Wisconsin, he enrolled at Rush Medical College, received his medical degree in 1918, and served his internship at Presbyterian Hospital. His first interest lay in the field of pathology. The skills he displayed in autopsy dissections of the brain at Cook County Hospital attracted the attention of the famous brain surgeon, Harvey Cushing, of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston. At about the same time, however, Dr. Oliver Ormsby, a world renowned dermatologist and Department Chairman at Rush became aware of Dr. Finnerud's potential as a dermatologist and dermatopathologist and invited Dr. Finnerud to join him in his office. The choice was difficult but Dr. Finnerud declined Dr. Cushing's offer. He subsequently trained and practiced with Dr. Ormsby for 17 years. In 1924 and 1925 Dr. Finnerud took graduate training in Vienna, London, and Paris. He held a faculty appointment at Rush Medical College from 1919 to 1942. When Rush suspended operations in 1942, he accepted a faculty appointment at the University of Illinois Medical School where he remained until 1968.

Dr. Finnerud served as President of the Chicago Dermatological Society in 1926, Vice-President of the American Academy of Dermatology (AAD) in 1940, Vice-President of the Society for Investigative Dermatology in 1941 and President of the American Dermatological Association (ADA) in 1957. In later years he was made an honorary member of both the AAD and the ADA as well as several European dermatological societies. He was also a charter member of the newly-formed American Board of Dermatology and Syphilology in 1935. Although he authored over 40 papers and book chapters, his major publishing achievement was the revision of successive editions of Dr. Ormsby's *Diseases of the Skin*, then this country's most authoritative textbook of dermatology and one which I personally remember well from my own Board preparation days.

Dr. Finnerud was a true philanthropist. His gifts to causes and institutions he believed in were many and generous. With the reactivation of Rush Medical College in 1971, Dr. Finnerud established the Clark W. Finnerud Endowed Scholarship Fund, which was further supported through gifts by his friends, patients and colleagues to provide grants-in-aid to outstanding students requiring financial assistance to attend medical school. When the Dermatology Foundation (DF) was established, Dr. Finnerud presented it with its first substantial

gift of \$50,000. In acknowledgment, the DF established the Clark W. Finnerud annual award in 1971 to be given to "an outstanding dermatologist who was a part-time teacher of dermatology and a part-time practitioner throughout the years, usually teaching without pay." He donated a 300-acre tract of Wisconsin land, subsequently named "The Finnerud Forest," to the University of Wisconsin to be preserved in its natural state for scientific research. He gave a fabulous collection of antique Persian and Turkish carpets to the Art Institute of Chicago and to Augustana College in Rock Island, Illinois. Additional gifts were made to the University of Chicago, to Duke University and to other institutions. Finally, posthumously, he provided major funds to endow the Clark W. Finnerud, M.D., Chair of Dermatology at Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center in 1981, when I was greatly honored to become its first appointee.

My own recollections of Clark W. Finnerud are chiefly those of a truly outstanding clinician, eminently concerned with his patients' welfare, and of a congenial, thoughtful, considerate man who had a very special concern for the instruction and professional progress of younger dermatologists. His non-professional interests, which I only appreciated in later years, would have classified him in today's parlance principally as an outdoorsman and environmentalist. He was most at home in his beloved wooded homesite in Northern Wisconsin, an expert on all forms of the surrounding flora and fauna. As one example, at one time he found and photographed all 52 varieties of orchids found in the state of Wisconsin.

Following a long illness, Dr. Finnerud died on October 10, 1977, at his home in Wisconsin. As Marion Sulzberger eloquently wrote, "...the life and works of Clark Wylie Finnerud have enriched medicine and dermatology, patients and acquaintances, colleagues, friends, and family. For Clark was indeed an unusual human being; he was a true friend to humanity and to all living things."

NEW CHAIRMAN AT UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO

After completing his residency in 1985, Dr. Shaw combined clinical and academic activities as a clinician educator and clinical researcher. His primary areas of interest are acne in adult women and HIV-related dermatology. He is the author of 35 published papers, abstracts and book chapters.

Dr. Shaw upholds the third generation of tradition in dermatology. His father, John Shaw (President, AAD 1978), and great uncle, Joseph Shaw, both attended Chicago Dermatological Society meetings during their residencies at the University of Michigan. His wife (also U of C faculty) and two youngest daughters live in Hyde Park where they can walk together to work and school. His eldest daughter just finished her first year at Tufts University.

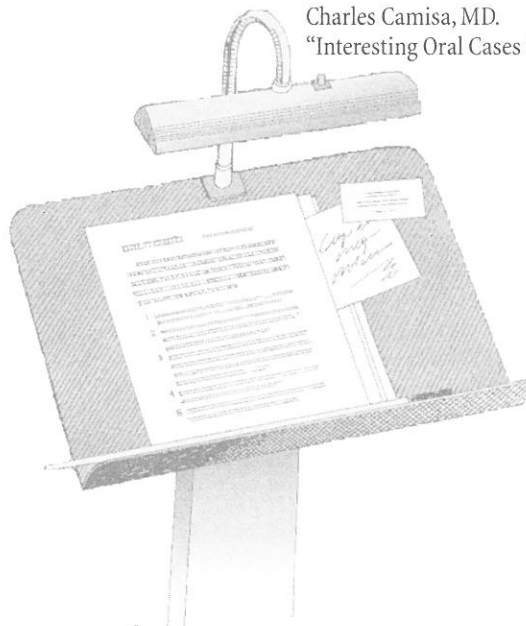

IN PASSING

CLARENCE S. LIVINGOOD, M.D. (1912-1998)

Dr. Clarence S. Livingood, Chairman Emeritus of the Dermatology Department at Henry Ford Hospital, Detroit, Michigan, died of leukemia on July 27, 1998, at his home in Grosse Pointe, Michigan.

During the course of his career, Dr. Livingood held leadership positions in all the major dermatology organizations. He served on several American Medical Association committees, where he acted as a spokesperson for dermatologists. In 1990, he became the first dermatologist honored with the AMA's Distinguished Service Award. During his post as Executive Director of the American Board of Dermatology from 1968 to 1992, Dr. Livingood helped establish the subspecialty of dermatopathology and conjoint board examination.

Dr. Livingood served in World War II, during which he cowrote "The Manual of Dermatology." After the war Dr. Livingood became professor and chair of the department of dermatology at Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, and subsequently at the University of Texas, Galveston. In 1953 he founded the dermatology department and residency program at Henry Ford Hospital.

A lover of baseball, Dr. Livingood was the team physician for the Detroit Tigers, a position he held for more than 30 years, starting in 1966.

MALCOLM C. SPENCER, M.D. (1913-1998)

Dr. Malcolm C. Spencer passed away on March 19, 1998, while on vacation in Port St. Lucie, Florida. He was born in 1913 in Bellflower, Illinois. His two marriages produced nine children and eleven grandchildren.

Dr. Spencer received his B.S. degree from the University of Illinois and his M.D. from the University of Chicago. After an internship at the Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit, Michigan, he completed his dermatology residency at the University of Pennsylvania. During his last two years in Philadelphia, he was associated in private practice with Donald M. Pillsbury, M.D., Chairman of the Department of Dermatology.

His professional memberships included the American Medical Association, Illinois Medical Association and the Vermilion County Medical Association. He was a Life Fellow of the American Academy of Dermatology, and a 50-year member of the Chicago Dermatological Society, of which he was vice president. Professionally, he consulted with organizations as diverse as Chanute Air Force Base, various veterans administrations and several pharmaceutical companies. His academic positions included associate professor at Northwestern University School of Medicine.

Dr. Spencer established the section of dermatology of the Illinois State Medical Society, later the Illinois Dermatological Society — of which he was secretary and president. While associated with Northwestern University, he worked in pharmacology with Professor K.K. Jones. As a result of their research on determination of skin fats, a second prize for individual research was awarded by the American Academy of Dermatology. In addition, he had several scientific exhibits at AAD annual Chicago meetings. He was recognized as the clinical investigator who established the effectiveness of hydroquinone as a depigmenting agent.

A world traveler, he and his wife attended scientific meetings across five continents.

The centennial meeting of the Chicago Dermatological Society will be held in October of the year 2001.

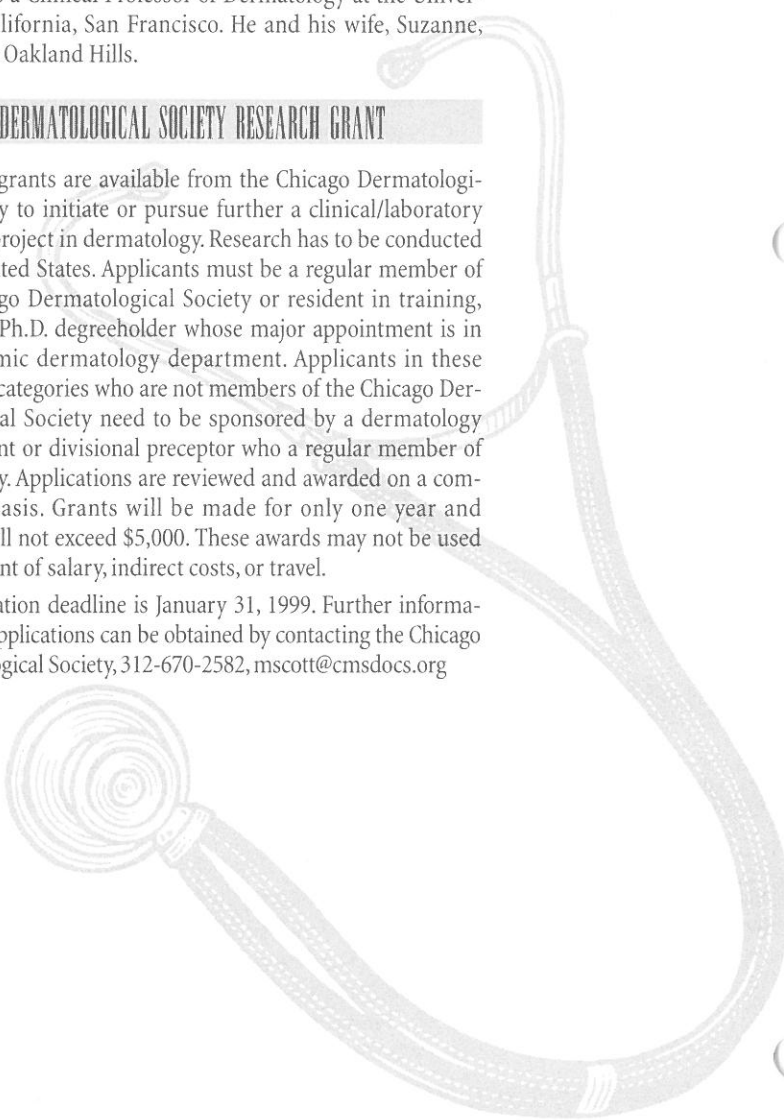
JOHN W. WEISS, M.D.

CHICAGO DERMATOLOGICAL SOCIETY RESEARCH GRANT

Research grants are available from the Chicago Dermatological Society to initiate or pursue further a clinical/laboratory research project in dermatology. Research has to be conducted in the United States. Applicants must be a regular member of the Chicago Dermatological Society or resident in training, fellow, or Ph.D. degreeholder whose major appointment is in an academic dermatology department. Applicants in these last three categories who are not members of the Chicago Dermatological Society need to be sponsored by a dermatology department or divisional preceptor who a regular member of the Society. Applications are reviewed and awarded on a competitive basis. Grants will be made for only one year and usually will not exceed \$5,000. These awards may not be used for payment of salary, indirect costs, or travel.

HISTORY OF THE ILLINOIS DERMATOLOGICAL SOCIETY



The Illinois Dermatological Society was founded in 1975 by Doctors Marshall Blankenship, Sylvia Griem and Ed Peterka in response to the gathering storm clouds of socio-economic change. The American Academy of Dermatology also encouraged the formation of state organizations with a tax code to allow for lobbying and other such activities. Thus the Chicago Dermatological Society was to remain the chief educational group and the Illinois Dermatological Society would become the socio-economic and political organization of dermatologists in Illinois. In retrospect this creation was very wise. In recent years many states have had to scramble quickly to create state dermatological societies capable of political activities.

Although the apparatus for socio-economic and political activities was in place, the first decade of the Illinois Dermatological Society was mainly concerned with educational activities around the state. Fall weekend meetings with guest speakers, case presentations, and social events were held in the Presidents' hometown areas in Peoria, Champaign, Springfield, Homewood, Rockford and Chicago. At first the fall weekends were held in months other than Chicago Dermatological Society weekend meetings; then they began to alternate years. As the Illinois Dermatological Society became more involved in political programs, it began to only sponsor a speaker at the Chicago Dermatological Society fall weekend meetings.

The existence of the Illinois Dermatological Society, which is administered by contract with the Illinois State Medical Society's specialty management services, gives Illinois dermatologists a non-voting seat at the Illinois State Medical Society House of Delegates. This allows introduction of resolutions. The passage of a state law regulating tanning parlors was the result of a resolution by the House of Delegates, introduced by the Illinois Dermatological Society, mandating full support of Illinois State Medical Society lobbyists in Springfield. A bill to regulate tattoo parlors was also introduced by the Illinois State Medical Society after a similar resolution by the Illinois Dermatological Society was passed by the House of Delegates.

The Illinois Dermatological Society has sponsored summer programs with speakers on coding, CLIA issues, OSHA compliance and sent all members material safety data sheets. The newsletter from the Midwestern Congress of Dermatological Societies comes partially from Illinois Dermatological Society dues.

The biggest effort in recent years has been directed toward passage of a direct access law in Illinois similar to legislation already in effect in Indiana, Georgia, and Florida. The American Academy of Dermatology Operation StateWatch has helped enormously with meetings, workshops, and computer programs matching legislators to dermatologists as well as money in the form of minigrants sponsored by Glaxo.

The Illinois Dermatological Society has also been the recipient of Dermatology Foundation lectureships sponsored at first by Neutrogena and now Galderma. There have been four such lectureships at Illinois Dermatological Society/Chicago Dermatological Society meetings with all expenses paid by the Dermatology Foundation Lecture Fund.

In 1978 the Chicago Dermatological Society and Illinois Dermatological Society voted to unify their memberships. The ability to send one annual dues statement for the Illinois Dermatological Society and the Chicago Dermatological Society has greatly decreased administrative costs. In a time

when our profession and our specialty are being assailed from all corners, unity is a most precious asset.

The Illinois Dermatological Society was founded to function as the socio-economic-political arm of Illinois dermatologists. In quieter times it sponsored mainly educational activities for its members, but now it produces educational programs for our patients, legislators and the public at large to enlighten them about the special skills of dermatologists and the importance of unhampered access to dermatologists by their patients.

I did an oncology fellowship at the University of Washington in Seattle. With its emphasis on bone marrow transplants the program was innovative and intense. My chairman, E. Donnell Thomas, won the Nobel Prize in Medicine for his work. Paul decided to move us back to Chicago (where did Dr. Olerud get those pictures of sunshine in Seattle?) and I became an attending oncologist at Loyola. I loved my work but early burn-out seemed inevitable. Mary Massa encouraged me to reconsider the field of dermatology. I am grateful for her support and especially to the faculty of University of Illinois: Drs. Lawrence Solomon, Virginia Fiedler, and Iris Aronson, for their willingness to take a chance on me. The past six years I've attended at Cook County Hospital, always learning something new from Drs. Darryl Bronson, Bruce Bennin, and the residents with whom I've worked along the way.

As much as I love dermatology the best part of my life is being a mother to Paul Delaney. He is the joy of each day.

It's an honor to be president of the Chicago Dermatological Society. Although not chronologically young, in dermatology years I'm still wet behind the ears!
