## CENTENNIAL MEETING

The centennial meeting of the Chicago Dermatological Society will be held on October 5, 6, and 7 of the year 2001. On this 100th anniversary, the Chicago Dermatological Society is very proud of the contributions made to the fund of dermatological knowledge. Through the years, many dermatologists in all areas of the country and the world have trained in Chicago. The CDS has provided a significant portion of that training. Many dermatologists have a special place in their hearts for our Society. The history, growth, and sphere of influence of the Society have given our organization an enviable position in American and world dermatology. To celebrate this event, the Centennial Committee is planning a weekend reunion for all Chicago alumni.

The headquarters of the centennial meeting will be the Drake Hotel on the Magnificent Mile in Chicago. There will be a welcoming reception on Friday night at the hotel. The program on Saturday morning will feature a number of scientific papers about past original work or significant contributions made by a member of the Chicago Dermatological Society followed by an up-to-date presentation of the current knowledge on the subject. This "Then and Now" theme will underscore our rich heritage of learning and leadership in the medical community.

There will be a centennial banquet on Saturday night at the Chicago Historical Society. The museum will be open for viewing its current exhibits as well as providing an appropriate background to celebrate our history. In addition to a lovely dinner, members and guests will be treated to a video presentation of the last 100 years of the Society. Sunday morning will consist of clinical patient presentations.

A complete history of the Society has been written by Marshall Blankenship, M.D. A traveling display of the history of the Chicago Dermatological Society will be shown at the centennial meeting, at the annual meeting of the American Academy of Dermatology, and at other local, regional, and national meetings.

Registration forms for the Centennial Meeting will be sent in early 2001 to all CDS members. Mark your calendar for October 5-7, 2001 and plan to attend this special Centennial Meeting.

## CHICAGO DERMATOLOGICAL SOCIETY - THE BEGINNING

The contributions of the early masters in dermatology produced the foundation of our specialty. The realization of how much current dermatologists owe these pioneers in dermatology comes only by becoming familiar with their enormous efforts. Great pleasure comes from a fuller acquaintance with some of the notable individuals and important episodes in the history of dermatology.

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In the mid-1800s, after three full years of attendance at medical school and in the hospital, the medical student graduated as a doctor of medicine. This new graduate had only the slightest acquaintance with the names of skin diseases, had no knowledge of the doctrines or principles of dermatology, and was wholly ignorant about practical diagnosis and treatment.

American physicians often continued their general medical education in European hospitals where they became more familiar with the appearance of skin diseases. After this experience, returning physicians recognized the need for improving dermatological care in the United States and made this improvement their duty. A few of these physicians were recognized as possessing exceptional knowledge of cutaneous diseases and gradually succeeded in convincing those interested in medical education of the importance of instructing students in skin diseases. These dermatologists were the founders of our specialty.

From 1866-1876 programs for teaching and studying dermatology were organized and a permanent journal of dermatology, as well as the American Dermatological Association, were established. Dermatologists in Chicago were among the leaders responsible for dermatology's transplantation from Europe.

Harvard University established the first department of dermatology in 1871. Chicago also was at the forefront of dermatological advancement when the teaching of dermatology began at Rush Medical College by James Nevins Hyde, M.D. in 1873. Dr. Hyde was the founder and organizer of the Chicago school of dermatology and the one who made Chicago a center of dermatological training. Dr. Hyde was the first Professor of Dermatology and chaired the first department of dermatology in Chicago. He began the teaching of clinical dermatology with his Clinic on Skin and Venereal Diseases and, in describing his course, he wrote, "The special importance to the practitioner of medicine of a knowledge of skin and venereal diseases should require no emphasis. No skillful diagnostician can afford to be ignorant of the surface markings on the body resulting from internal disease: there is no surgeon who should not be able, before he takes the knife in hand, to recognize a disorder which is capable of complete relief without operative procedure."

Dr. Hyde wrote an important early textbook, was able to recruit outstanding physicians into dermatology including Drs. Frank Montgomery and Oliver Ormsby, was affiliated with the American Dermatological Association from its inception, and joined the proud company of dermatology's early leaders. The accomplishments of these early leaders were attained with

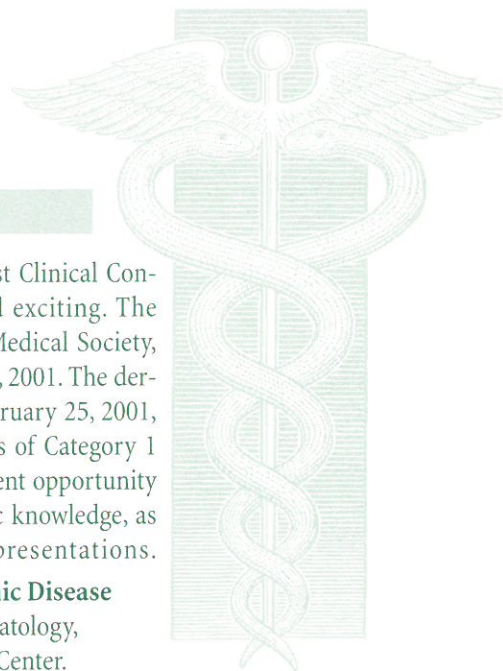

only scant support – indeed often despite bitter hostility.

William Allen Pusey, M.D. became Professor of Dermatology at the College of Physicians and Surgeons (later the University of Illinois) at the age of 29 in 1894. His leadership and influence continued the growth of dermatology in Chicago started by Dr. Hyde. Dr. Pusey was an early expert in roentgen therapy of skin diseases and published *Roentgen Rays in Therapeutics and Diagnosis* in 1903. Dr. Pusey remarked, "Skin diseases occur on the surface of the body where every one can see them, but few recognize them. Because of the first fact and in spite of the second fact, most physicians are inclined to treat them." Dr. Pusey became editor of the *Archives of Dermatology and Syphilology* and is the only dermatologist ever elected to the presidency of the American Medical Association.

Oliver Ormsby, M.D. became associated with Dr. Hyde, followed him at Rush in 1913, and continued with Dr. Hamilton Montgomery the revision of *Practical Treatise on Diseases of the Skin* through multiple editions. This textbook was the "bible" for many dermatologists during their residencies.

On February 9, 1901 Dr. Hyde invited Dr. Pusey (Dr. Ormsby was in London) and seven other dermatologists to an informal dinner at the University Club of Chicago for the purpose of organizing the Chicago Dermatological Society. The constitution and by-laws were written in longhand and adopted by unanimous vote with the object of the Society to be "the cultivation of dermatology in all its branches." Dr. Hyde, followed by Dr. Ormsby and Dr. Pusey guided and shaped the policies of the Chicago Dermatological Society for the next 40 years.

Dr. Pusey wrote, "It is the physician's fate soon to be lost to memory. Some of his work, and with it his name, may remain, but the memory of the man himself is lost. It will be a misfortune if the memories of the personalities of our pioneers disappear with the generation who knew them." Publications by Drs. William A. Pusey, Samuel Zakon, Max Wein, Henry Michelson, Allen Lorincz, Fred Malkinson and myself have attempted to keep such memories from being lost.
